
2009 Stat comps

The following pages show our crime rate stats. The first page shows the BCI 2008 overview. This also includes a snap shot of the Washington County Agencies that submit data to BCI. This report shows that Washington County has an average crime rate of 25.34 index crimes per 1,000 residents. LaVerkin is about half of that with 12.70 crimes per 1,000 residents. Following that overview is the 2008 UCR "A" report. This shows an overall number of index crimes. BCI does not count simple assaults in the index crime report. The next page is the 2009 UCR "A" report. While the numbers are different between the two reports we ended up with the same total number of index crime reports for 2009 as we did in 2008.

After the UCR reports is a five page report that shows the offenses of 2009 compared to the offenses of 2008. We were down from 2118 offenses to 1859 offenses. This is a drop of 259 offenses or approximately down 12.2%. There was on generally a drop in most things. Most significantly in Agency Assist calls. For several months we simply had no one to respond to help out other agencies. Other areas that were down were officer initiated activities. We did have an increase in warrant services. I believe that this is due in part to our participation on the Joint Criminal Apprehension Team. This is a multi-agency team that hunts down people with warrants within the County area. Another area of increase was suspicious activity and areas wanting extra patrol.

The next sheet simply shows our Incidents and Offenses. Incidents are usually one call but multiple offenses can happen during that one call. For example the officer gets called to car crash and finds the driver drunk. That will be one incident but two offenses. The crash and the DUI would be a separate offense.

The graph following the Incidents and Offenses are the total citation and violation graph. Usually you issue one citation on a stop but you may issue multiple violations on that one citation. For example you stop a car for speeding. You issue one ticket but you put speeding, no seatbelt and no insurance on that ticket. That would be one citation and three violations.



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2008 Overview

The population figures used in this book are estimates based on data received from the U.S. Census Bureau. In the *Crime in Utah* editions prior to 1993, BCI used population estimates provided by the FBI. As a result, crime rates published in this report will not be identical to the Utah crime rates used in the FBI publications. The U. S. Census Bureau's web site that gives the population figures and the methodology used is located here: <http://www.census.gov>.

- In 2008, a total of 96,555 index crimes were committed, which indicates a 2.07% decrease in the overall crime rate from 2007.
- The violent crime rate decreased 4.09% from the previous year; with decreases in the homicide rate (29.09%), rape (3.79%), robbery rate (1.87%), and the aggravated assault rate (4.64%).
- Firearms were used in 34.55% of the homicides reported.
- 21.57% of the homicides reported involved family relationships, 66.67% did not, and in 11.76% the victim/offender relationship was unknown.
- The property crime rate decreased 1.93%.
- The burglary rate decreased 7.86%.
- The larceny rate increased 1.37%.

The value of property stolen amounted to \$96,866,741. Of that amount, \$25,259,165 was recovered, indicating a 26.08% recovery rate.

- Residential burglaries accounted for 65.10% of all burglaries. Of all residential burglaries, 58.73% were known to be committed during daytime hours (6:00 am to 6:00 pm).
- Reported hate crimes decreased from 59 in 2007 to 44 in 2008, a 25.42% decrease.







Law Enforcement Officers per Agency Report

The next page shows the 2008 report of Law Enforcement officers per agency. It has our goal be consistent with the overall state average of 1.74 full-time employees per 1,000 residents. As you can see the average of Washington County is 2.68 full-time employees per 1,000 residents. This does include jailers and clerical help and not just officers. You will be able to see from the report where the various agencies in Washington County were at in 2008.

2008 Law Enforcement Employees Per Agency

Because of law enforcement's differing service requirements and functions as well as the varied demographic traits and characteristics of jurisdictions, use caution when drawing comparisons between agency staffing levels based upon police employment data from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. It must be remembered that the totals given for sworn officers for any particular agency reflect not only the patrol officers on the street but also officers assigned to various other duties such as those in administrative and investigative positions as well as those assigned to special teams.

Data Collection:

- Each year, law enforcement agencies in Utah report the total number of sworn law enforcement officers and civilians in their agency as of October 31 to the UCR Program.
- The UCR Program defines law enforcement officers as individuals who ordinarily carry a firearm and a badge, have full arrest powers, and are paid from government funds set aside specifically for law enforcement.
- Civilian employees include personnel such as clerks, radio dispatchers, meter attendants, stenographers, jailers, correctional officers, and mechanics, provided that they are full-time employees of the agency.

Overview:

- In 2008, sworn officers accounted for 61.12% of all law enforcement personnel in Utah.
- The rate of full-time law enforcement employees (civilian and sworn) per 1,000 inhabitants in Utah for 2008 was 2.84; the rate of sworn officers was 1.74 per 1,000. The UCR Program computes these rates by taking the number of employees, dividing by the population of agency's jurisdiction, and multiplying by 1,000.
- Female employees accounted for 49.93% of all full-time civilian law enforcement employees in 2008.
- Males accounted for 92.70% of all full-time sworn law enforcement officers in 2008.

The two pages following are assaults on Utah Officers. The next two reports are from the FBI and represent the nation wide assaults and felonious deaths.

It is just February and already we have had two different incidents in which LaVerkin City Officers have been assaulted. Fortunately all involved officers are all right and continue with their duties.

In 2009 unofficially there were 120 law enforcement related deaths including accidents. In 2009 there were 10 deaths from Jan 1, 2009 to Feb 17, 2009. Currently in 2010 from Jan 1 to Feb 17 there have been 29 deaths. This is an increase of 107%. You can find more details on <http://www.odmp.org/>






Law Enforcement Officers Feloniously Killed

This page provides information about duly sworn city, university and college, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement officers who were feloniously killed in the line of duty during 2008 and who met certain other criteria.

Overview

- 41 law enforcement officers were feloniously killed in the line of duty in 2008.
- 22 of the slain officers were employed by city police departments. Of these, 12 were members of law enforcement agencies in cities with 250,000 or more inhabitants.
- Line-of-duty deaths occurred in 19 states. Twenty officers lost their lives in the South, the Nation's most populous region. Nine of the officers died in the West, 9 died in the Midwest, and 3 officers who were feloniously slain were employed in the Northeast.

Victim profile

- The average age of the officers who were feloniously killed in 2008 was 39 years.
- The slain officers' average length of law enforcement service was 10 years.
- Of the 41 officers slain in 2008, 37 were male and 4 were female.
- 30 of the victim officers were white, 9 were black, and 1 was American Indian/Alaskan Native. The race of 1 officer was not provided.

Circumstances

- 9 officers died in 2008 from felonious attacks during arrest situations.
- 8 officers died during traffic pursuits/stops.
- 7 officers died while investigating suspicious persons/circumstances.
- 7 officers died during tactical situations (barricaded offender, hostage taking, etc.).
- 6 officers died in ambush situations.
- 2 officers died during investigative activity (surveillance, search, interview, etc.).
- 1 officer was killed while handling, transporting, or maintaining custody of a prisoner.
- 1 officer died after responding to a disturbance call.

Assignments

- 27 officers who were slain in 2008 were on assigned vehicle patrol.
- 3 of the slain officers were off duty but acting in an official capacity.
- 11 officers were assigned to other duties, such as special assignments or undercover, when they were murdered.
- Of the 41 officers slain in 2008, 18 were assisted at the time of the attacks.
- 20 officers were alone and unassisted at the time of the incidents.

Weapons

- 35 officers were killed in 2008 with firearms. Of these, 25 were killed with handguns. (A breakdown of the types of weapons used in these slayings is provided in Table 27.)
- 4 officers were killed with their own weapons.
- 4 officers attempted to use their weapons; 11 officers fired their weapons.
- 19 officers were slain with firearms when they were 0-5 feet from the offenders.

Body armor

- 32 of the 41 officers feloniously killed in 2008 were wearing body armor at the time of their murders.
- Of the 29 officers who were wearing body armor and killed with firearms:
 - 9 suffered wounds to the front of the head.
 - 6 were shot in the side of the head.
 - 5 were wounded in the front upper torso/chest.
 - 4 were shot in the neck/throat.
 - 3 were shot in the front lower torso/stomach.
 - 1 was shot in the rear of the head.
 - 1 was shot in the rear upper torso/back.

Regional and outlying area breakdowns

Of the 41 officers who died in 2008 as a result of felonious attacks:

- 20 officers were employed in the South.
- 9 officers were employed in the West.
- 9 officers were employed in the Midwest.
- 3 officers were employed in the Northeast.

Months, days, and times of incidents

- More officers (8) died from felonious assaults that occurred in January than in any other month.
- 8 officers were involved in fatal assaults that occurred on Friday, more than on any other day of the week.
- More officers (13) were fatally injured in assaults that happened from 12:01 to 4 a.m. than at any other time period.

Profile of alleged known assailants

In 2008, 42 alleged offenders were identified in connection with law enforcement officers feloniously killed. Of those offenders, the following characteristics are known:

- The average age of the alleged offenders was 32 years old.
- The average height was 5 feet 9 inches tall, and the average weight was 180 pounds.
- 40 of the alleged offenders were male; 2 were female.

- 20 of the alleged offenders were white; 21 were black; and 1 was Asian/Pacific Islander.
- 36 of the 42 alleged offenders had prior criminal arrests.
- 11 of the alleged offenders were under judicial supervision at the time of the incidents.
- 2 of the alleged offenders were intoxicated or under the influence of alcohol at the time of the fatal incidents.

Law Enforcement Officers Assaulted

The following information concerns duly sworn city, university and college, county, state, and tribal law enforcement officers who were assaulted in the line of duty in 2008 and met certain other criteria.

Overview

- In 2008, a total of 10,110 law enforcement agencies submitted assault data to the FBI. These agencies employed 518,120 officers who served more than 226 million people, representing nearly 75 percent of the Nation's population. (Based on Table 65.)
- Law enforcement agencies reported that 58,792 officers were assaulted in the line of duty.
- The rate of these offenses was 11.3 officer assaults per 100 sworn officers in 2008.

Injuries

- Of all the officers assaulted, 26.1 percent sustained injuries.
- Among officers who were assaulted with personal weapons (e.g., hands, fists, or feet), 27.8 percent were injured.
- Of those attacked with knives or other cutting instruments, 13.4 percent suffered injuries.
- Of the officers who were assaulted with firearms, 8.4 percent were injured.
- Among officers who were assaulted with other dangerous weapons, 22.6 percent sustained injuries.

Times of incidents

- For the tenth consecutive year, 12:01 to 2 a.m. was the time frame in which most officer assaults occurred, accounting for 15.5 percent of all officer assaults.
- The time frame in which the fewest officer assaults happened was 6:01 to 8 a.m., accounting for 2.4 percent of those incidents.

Circumstances

- In 2008, the largest percentage of officers assaulted (32.0 percent) were responding to disturbance calls (family quarrels, bar fights, etc.).
- The second-highest percentage of officers assaulted (15.1 percent) were attempting other arrests.
- The third-highest percentage of officers assaulted (11.8 percent) were handling, transporting, or maintaining custody of prisoners.

Clearances

Law enforcement agencies can clear offenses by arrests or exceptional means (i.e., when law enforcement can identify the perpetrator but are unable to make an arrest due to circumstances beyond their control, such as the death or suicide of the subject).

- Of the 58,792 reported assaults on law enforcement officers in 2008, law enforcement agencies cleared 88.5 percent.
- By type of circumstance, agencies cleared the greatest percentage of officer assaults (90.8 percent) for incidents involving calls to civil disorder scenes (mass disobedience, riot, etc.).

Assignments

- 62.7 percent of the law enforcement officers who were assaulted were assigned to 1-officer vehicle patrols.
- 17.8 percent of the officers who were assaulted were assigned to 2-officer vehicle patrols.
- 5.1 percent of officers who were assaulted were assigned to detective duties or special assignments.
- 14.4 percent of officers who were assaulted were assigned to other official duties.

(Based on Table 69.)

Weapons

- The majority of officers who were assaulted in the line of duty in 2008—80.7 percent—were attacked with personal weapons.
- 3.8 percent of the officers were assaulted with firearms.
- 1.6 percent of the officers were assaulted with knives or other cutting instruments.
- 13.9 percent of the officers were assaulted with other dangerous weapons.
